To the Honorable William W. Holt Judge of the Superior Court in and for the Middle District of Georgia – Holding and [availing?] Jurisdiction in Equity.

Humbly complaining herewith unto your Honor, your Orator John C. Poythress, that by the last will and Testament of George Poythress late of the State of Florida, deceaseds vehicle, said Will is hereto annexed and marked (Exhibit A) to which your petitioner prays leave to refer and that this same may be taken and received as a part of this his petition, he was affirmed with one James W Axum then of the Territory of Florida Executors .

Your Petitioner further sheweth that your petitioner qualified as Executor both in the Territory of Florida and State of Georgia and that his Co-executor qualified in the Territory aforesaid but that he shortly after departed this life. Your Petitioner further sheweth unto your Honor that by said Last Will and Testament he was appointed with the said James W. Axum Trustees of the property bequeathed in said Will to his half Sister Mary Mandell now Mary Cheesborough the wife of William Cheesborough.

Your Petitioner further sheweth that finding the property consisting of Lands and Negroes in Florida very unavailable he removed the latter to the County of Burke in the State of Georgia and under a decree in Equity disposed of the Land in Florida and purchased land in said County of Burke. Your petitioner further shows to your Honor that he hath hereto appended an inventory and statement of this property of the said cestui que Trust Mary E. Cheesborough now in possession of your Orator as trustee aforesaid marked Exhibit (B) and prays the same be taken as part of this Bill and leave to refer thereto as often as may be necessary.

Your Petitioner further sheweth to your Honor that such is the condition and State of his health being very infirm and scarcely enabled to give any attention to his own Interest certainly nothing like that which it requires and Dr. William Cheesborough the husband of the said Mary and your Petitioner not being on such terms as will render a continuation of his trusteeship pleasant either to the one or the other and Alexander J. Lawson being willing and assenting to take upon himself the trust as aforesaid the said Alexander J being the maternal Uncle of the said Mary Cheesborough your petitioner prays that he may be removed from said trusteeship and that the said Alexander J Lawson may be appointed by and with the consent of said Mary the Trustee of the said Mary in the place and stead of your Petitioner. And may it Please your Honor to grant unto your petitioner the States most gracious writ of Subpoena directed to the said William B. Cheesborough and Mary Cheesborough requiring them to be and appear at the next Superior Court to be held in and for the County of Burke on the third Monday in May next there and then to answer the [formalities?]

And may it please your Honor to grant unto your Orator such other and further relief as to your Honor may deem meet and equitqble and your Orator as in duty bound will ever pray &c 20th April 1848 B[errun?] & Pepper Sol [solicitors] for Petitioner

This Defendant answering saith that she admits all the allegations in the said Complainant's said Bill of Complaint set forth [touching?] the last will and testament of her Deceased Father George Poythress. She also admits the feeble state of health of Complainant with the other reasons set forth in Complainant's Bill of Complaint. Defendant further answering saith that while she sincerely regrets the necessity which has induced the application for a change of the Trusteeship and she [smbts?] with Complainant in praying that your Honor may decree that the said John C Poythress may be released and removed from the burden of said Trusteeship and that her maternal Uncle Alexander J Lawson who has consented to accept the same may be appointed the Trustee in the Stead and place of the said John C. Poythress and that your Honor may make such other and further decree as may deem meet and equitable.

Mary E Cheeseborough

I consent to act as Trustee in the stead and place of John C. Poythress as prayed for in the aforegoing Bill of Complaint.

11th May 1848 A.J. Lawson

We the Jury find and decree that John C. Poythress the aforesaid Trustee of Mary E. Cheeseborough be removed from the Trusteeship as prayed for and that Alexander James Lawson who has given his consent to act be appointed the Trustee in the stead and place of the said John C. Poythress and that the said Alexander J. Lawson be vested with all the power and charged with all the duties which in and by the will of George Poythress deceased were granted to or imposed upon the former Trustees the said John C Poythress and James W Axum and we further find that the cost and expenses of that [per accounting?] be paid out of income of the said Trust Estate.
